The Kingston Arts Council (KAC) is pleased to share our Annual Report for the 2023-2024 fiscal year (1 April 2023 – 31 March 2024). This report offers a review of our grant programs, services, and activities for the year. Program highlights and statistics serve to illuminate the impact of the KAC on the broader Katarokwi/Kingston community.

This past year marked a period of steady, gradual growth for the organization; with new leadership, we worked repositioning the KAC and strengthening connections across our community. The KAC office gradually reopened to the public, with regular open office hours introduced in April 2023 after over three years of COVID-related closures. As KAC settled back into our office space at the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning, we explored new ways of engaging our community, reintroducing the UNIT 115 exhibition program and welcoming visitors for in-person meetings, events, and drop in office hours. Simultaneously, we began to explore options for in-person engagement with our community while still providing virtual engagement opportunities, securing a community booth at Skeleton Park Arts Festival, hosting a hybrid Annual General Meeting and Talkback Session, conducting onsite and offsite visits and talks with student and community groups, and more. We're thrilled to report that the KAC office has once again become a space where community members and visitors of all kinds regularly drop in to ask questions, learn, and explore.

The KAC maintained its staff of three (Nicole Daniels, Violet Tang, and Katherine Dionne) throughout 2023-2024 and welcomed three new members to our Board of Directors: Diane Black, Brett Christopher, and Rae MacDonald. As an oversight Board, our Directors ensured that the legal, financial and fiduciary requirements of the KAC were upheld.

KAC administered \$619,345 in funding through the City of Kingston Arts Fund in 2023, supporting artists and their organizations through Operating and Project Grants. 2023 also marked the commencement of the City-led CKAF Review, for which the City of Kingston has hired the consulting firm Saffy. The CKAF Review is rooted in community, involves broad public consultation, and is conducted from a place that prioritizes equity, diversity, and inclusion. The KAC remains eager to support this process however we can, and we look forward to improving and hopefully expanding the CKAF program in alignment with the recommendations that come forth through the CKAF Review.

In light of these developments, the KAC reassessed its Strategic Planning timeline in 2023. In recognition of the sustained relevance of our current Strategic Plan, Connected, Vocal, Strong, and the ongoing work required in alignment with our strategic priorities, the KAC Board voted to extend the Strategic Plan by an additional year. We look forward to developing a new Strategic Plan in 2024-2025, and continue to solicit community feedback and initiate grassroots consultations in a variety of fora to ensure our next Plan is deeply rooted in the priorities and needs of our community.

2023-2024 was a successful year for the KAC in many different ways. We wish to thank all those who continue to support and engage with the KAC for your ongoing investment in the organization's vitality. We look forward to continuing the growth and development of the KAC in the years to come!

GRANTS

The Kingston Arts Council administers two key funding programs: the City of Kingston Arts Fund and the Nan Yeomans Grant for Artistic Development.

THE CITY OF KINGSTON ARTS FUND (CKAF) provides grants to local arts organizations, collectives, and individual artists to foster creativity at all levels and enrich how Kingston residents experience and engage with the arts. It is administered by KAC and applications are assessed by a jury of peers from the Kingston arts community. There are two types of funding that are made available through CKAF: Operating Grants (70%) and Project Grants (30%).

Operating Grants provide a crucial foundation for nonprofit arts organizations, increasing administrative capacities and professional and artistic development opportunities. **Project Grants** fund the creation and presentation of artistic projects and connect diverse audiences with art activities across the city.

Through CKAF, artists and their organizations are able to develop programming, art activities, partnerships, and initiatives that encourage arts engagement, learning opportunities and participation. These funds are an investment in Kingston's cultural capital and they foster cultural vitality, increase the capacity of the arts community, encourage residents to connect with the arts and ultimately enhance Kingston's cultural economy, promoting financial stability and sustainability of the sector.

NAN YEOMANS GRANT FOR ARTISTIC DEVELOPMENT

The Nan Yeomans Grant for Artistic Development aims to help young visual artists and/or artisans further their artistic growth and education. It awards one annual grant of \$2,500 to an emerging artist between 17 and 40 years old, who may be practicing in any visual medium including painting, printmaking, photography, sculpture, installation, pottery, fabric, glass, metal, film and/or video. All applicants must have an address in the Kingston area, which includes the City as well as the Townships of Loyalist, South Frontenac, Central Frontenac, North Frontenac, and Frontenac Islands. The grant is intended for training or focused creation that will contribute to the artist's development and career.

Applications are assessed by a jury of peers based on eligibility, financial need, and artistic merit. The grant is made possible through an endowment fund administered by the Community Foundation for Kingston & Area.



2023 RECIPIENT: **KELSEY DAWN PEARSON**

Kelsey Dawn Pearson is an artist residing in Katarokwi/Kingston. They recently graduated from Concordia University with an MFA in Print Media and hold a BFA from NSCAD. Pearson is a multidisciplinary artist using print, natural fibres and puppetry / performance as their main media. Pearson's work explores themes of gender and body dysmorphia in relation to bodily connection to land.

Their work is supernatural, chaotic and colourful swampwater. They explore themes of distorted reality, confront personal ethics, battle dysphoria, bridge fiction and the present through the use of portals, touch, feel and play... In a world bordering ours.

In addition to our existing Arts Job Board, the KAC launched the Opportunities Board in August 2023 and the Grants Board in October 2023. MAYOR'S ARTS AWARDS

The Mayor's Arts Awards is an annual recognition program that celebrates artistic achievement as well as extraordinary support for and contributions to the arts. By increasing the profile of the arts in Kingston, the Mayor's Arts Awards affirms the value of the arts as a source of creativity, innovation and pride and nurtures the sustained development of the cultural sector to the benefit of all Kingston residents. The City of Kingston, through the Arts & Culture Services department, administers the Mayor's Arts Awards program. The Kingston Arts Council leads the production of video profiles of the awardees as well as the promotion of the awards to its networks.

The Creator Award recognizes living artists, collectives or arts organizations. Three Creator Awards are given each year to honour artistic merit and/or innovation that advances the arts in the city, contributes to the development of the art form and expresses the cultural vitality of Kingston.

The Arts Champion Award recognizes a living individual, organization or corporation who makes an extraordinary, leading contribution to the arts in Kingston as a volunteer, advocate, supporter, sponsor and/or philanthropist.

The Limestone Arts Legacy Award recognizes individuals of the past whose sustained and substantial contributions have built the artistic vitality of the City, nurturing and enabling forms of creation, participation, presentation and enjoyment, whose leadership has inspired others and whose influence has been felt in the region and beyond.

CREATOR AWARDS

Sasha Jimenez French is a multidisciplinary Cuban American artist. Through her thriving visual arts practice, dance instruction and performance, Sasha is a strong community leader and a driving force for community building in the arts. Sasha teaches at the Kingston School of Dance and is a former Creativity Studio Artist at the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning. Sasha's arts practice is now based in a new studio space in downtown Kingston, where she continues to inspire others, working collaboratively to create opportunities for artists, develop creative projects, and build collective spaces to make art accessible.

Savannah Shea is a Kingston based singer-songwriter, multi-instrumentalist, visual artist, and poet. She is an active musician in the Kingston community, regularly performing at local venues including as part of her Sunday afternoon weekly series of folk, jazz, blues, and original tunes at Musiikki Café, and at festivals, and events. Savannah is community minded and a true collaborator, frequently working with fellow artists on creative and cross-disciplinary projects and she provides a strong presence for artists seeking live accompaniment or original compositions.

Blue Canoe Theatrical Productions Inc. is a non-profit, community theatre and youth-led organization that creates opportunities for youth under the age of 30 to gain experience in the performing arts by developing a professional, safe, fun, and engaging atmosphere for youth to work together on theatrical productions. Blue Canoe strives to select programming based upon the ability to offer as many opportunities to youth as possible, selecting work that offers an equal opportunity for the youth of various ages with a focus on, but not limited to, musical theatre.



ARTS CHAMPION AWARD

Jermaine Marshall graduated with a Bachelor of Laws degree from the University of the West Indies and a Master of Arts in Social Justice and Equity Studies and then joined the Queen's University Human Rights and Equity Office in 2021 as the Inclusion and Anti-Racism Advisor. Despite his short time in Kingston, Jermaine has proven himself incredibly community oriented. Performing under the name J-Marsh, Jermaine is an independent vocalist and poet whose art weaves together his love for spoken word poetry and freeform dancing, often investigating his identity as a proud queer Jamaican within the polarizing atmosphere of his home country. Jermaine has been active in organizing Black History Month and Emancipation Day events, and helping to expand the visibility of black artists in the Kingston Arts community, while encouraging engagement with the community as a whole, and advancing spaces for equity and diversity in the city.

LIMESTONE ARTS LEGACY AWARD

Bronwen Wallace (1945-1989) was a poet, short-story writer, and mentor to many aspiring authors as a creative writing instructor at Queen's University and St. Lawrence College in Kingston, ON. Born in Kingston, she remained deeply committed to the community she called home most of her life. In addition to her teaching, her activism and involvement in feminist movements was reflected in her work at Interval House women's shelter, and her column in the Kingston Whig-Standard. As a testament to her continued influence and impact on the writing community, the RBC Bronwen Wallace Award for Emerging Writers was established in her honour in 1994 by a group of friends and colleagues to honour her belief that writers should have more opportunities for recognition early in their careers. "She was always also tuned into the alternative voices, the signals of change and of hope. She believed in people and in the strength of people to survive and prevail." - Chris Whynot



THE ART OF EDI

Presented by the Kingston Arts Council and the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning collaboration with KEYS Newcomer and Employment Services and the Kingston and Area Association of Museums, Art Galleries, and Historic Sites.

The Art of EDI was a collaborative community event centred around principles of equity, diversity. inclusion, and accessibility, offering Katarokwi/Kingston arts community critical free EDIа focused learning opportunity. Natalia Martinelli-Luengo facilitated a workshop on equity-focused hiring practices. Performances presentations by artists Erin Ball, Maxime Beauregard, Mance Granberg St-Aubin, Elizabeth Morris, and Theresa Upton showcased and attendees educated on diverse pertaining perspectives to accessibility, neurodiversity, culture, and Indigenous culture. A culminating Q&A session with the artists provided a platform for attendees to engage in dialogue encouraging collaborative efforts toward a more equitable arts sector. The event additionally sought to model various forms of accessibility by offering a relaxed event format, an access table and sensory break space, access notes provided prior to the event, ASL interpretation and captions.




CKAF PROJECT GRANTS INFORMATION SESSION

This information session guided new and returning Project Grant applicants through a detailed review of the 2024 CKAF Project Grant Guidelines, Application Forms, and Assessment Criteria. and offered a Q&A with KAC staff. This free event was held virtually via Zoom, with ASL interpretation provided. **KAC** additionally offered a series of one-on-one meetings for potential Operating and Project Grant applicants.

NAN YEOMANS DROP IN DAY

In 2023, KAC introduced a "Drop In Day" for the Nan Yeomans grant program, offering opportunity for potential applicants to seek support in their grant writing process in a casual, welcoming environment. KAC continued to offer one-onmeetings to potential applicants, but the introduction of the Drop In Day aimed to increase accessibility of KAC support services.



CULTURE DAYS

GLOBAL ROOTS: MAPPING CULTURES

KAC collaborated with fellow Tett tenants for a building-wide Culture Days event in 2023. Visitors were invited to explore tenant studios at the Tett and create items to hang on the Tree of Life, a collaborative which was installation later exhibited in KAC's UNIT 115 exhibition space. KAC's activity. Global Roots: Mapping Cultures, invited visitors to explore ideas of culture and community through creative writing and illustration.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

KAC additionally engaged the community via participation in offsite community programs and events, and reintroducing onsite activities after three years of COVID-related closures.

This included running a community booth at Skeleton Park Arts Festival in 2023 with both community discussion and artmaking activities; speaking at the Queen's BFA Annual General Meeting; offsite and onsite visits and talks with a variety of student and community groups; and hosting an hybrid AGM with a Talkback Session.



UNIT 115 EXHIBITIONS

UNIT 115 is a small exhibition space in the foyer of the Kingston Arts Council office. After over three years of closures resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, the KAC reactivated the UNIT 115 exhibition program in May 2023. Throughout 2023-2024, 115 operated UNIT as exploratory exhibition space for partnerships, collaborations, and communityengaged projects with local arts groups. Below are some highlights from the 2023-2024 exhibition season.

75TH ANNIVERSARY EXHIBITION

KINGSTON HANDLOOM **WEAVERS & SPINNERS**

Presented in conjuction with an exhibition in the Tett Gallery, this exhibit featured new and historical works from KHWS in celebration of milestone 75th their anniversary.

CREATIVITY STUDIOS EXHIBIT

NATALIE BOHNEN-TWIDDY, SASHA JIMENEZ FRENCH, BETHANY GARNER, ALICE MELO, MICHELLE REID, ADELE WEBSTER

This exhibition featured a small series of new and experimental works from the Tett's Creativity Studio Artists.

GATHER / STRETCH

KAC x SASHA JIMENEZ FRENCH

gather/stretch explored communal artmaking through extended collaborations. This participatory exhibition invited visitors to engage with the installation, first by adding to the piece (gather), then by taking away from it (stretch). The installation was extension of two community artmaking activities run by KAC and Sasha Jimenez French at Skeleton Park Arts Festival, which later came together to form the basis for gather/stretch.

PRIDE QUILT INITIATIVE

KINGSTON SCHOOL OF ART X LIMESTONE DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD

This collaborative project invited LDSB school-based, equity-related clubs and interested individuals and families to design a series of squares reflecting on the theme of Pride, which were then stitched into give quilts. KAC

UNIT 115 was activated to engage visitors in visual and written dialogue regarding community needs and priorities, KAC services and sector gaps, and the arts more broadly in Katarokwi/Kingston.

CERAMICS RE:CONSIDERED

KINGSTON POTTERS' GUILD

A celebration of the inaugural KPG Mentorship Program. This yearlong opportunity empowered ceramic artists to transform and revitalize their pottery practices. Each mentee was challenged to stretch creatively, finding and pursuing their individual goals in clay. Mentees' studies and works in progress were exhibited in UNIT 115, with final pieces exhibited simultaneously in the Tett Gallery.

IN BETWiN: Stories of Immigrants featured series of portraits depicting individuals from various nationalities Kingston. residina in Through this project, ongoing Venezuelan-Canadian emerging artist Sergio Jaua interviews Kingstonians to learn about their immigration journeys and develop multimedia portraits stories. inspired by their exhibition explored the concept of "inbetweenness," felt by immigrants, while building community interpersonal and fostering connections. IN BETWIN celebrated with KAC's first opening reception in over three years, and a sleek new look for UNIT 115.

THRIFT FOR ART'S SAKE

MODERN FUEL ARTIST-RUN CENTRE

This innovative fundraiser developed by Modern Fuel featured a pop up "thrift store" selling gently used clothing items accessories, and small household items. Proceeds primarily supported Modern Fuel's operations and programming, with a 20% administrative fee on sales in UNIT 115 paid to support KAC's operations. This innovative fundraising model invited community members to support their local arts organizations while shopping sustainably, and additionally offered a new way to donate gently used goods.

REVENUE HIGHLIGHTS

- Our major funders, the City of Kingston and the Ontario Arts Council, continued to providing stable funding to the KAC in 2023-2024.
- KAC received additional funding in the amount of \$8,695 via the Community Foundation for Kingston and Area's Fall 2023 Community Grants Program. These funds, deferred to 2024-2025, supported the purchase of new computers for the KAC office.

EXPENSE HIGHLIGHTS

- The KAC invested over \$25,000 in artists through the payment of fees for event facilitation, grants adjudication, and the completion of artistic work and services.
- KAC maintained a full staff complement of two permanent full-time employees and one permanent part-time employee.
- KAC invested more into public events, salaries, and artist fees in 2023-2024, directing our funding to support and grow our local arts community.

OVERVIEW + GENERAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The KAC's unrestricted net assets are \$39,441, maintaining a healthy contingency fund for the organization. KAC's unrestricted net assets were reduced by \$6,417 in 2023-2024.
- The KAC additionally holds restricted net assets in the amount of \$17,543 (charitable gaming funds). KAC's restricted net assets were reduced by \$4,333 in 2023-2024, supporting KAC's goal to expend its surplus of charitable gaming funds.




